Camelot has organised a free breakfast briefing on October 15 at the Wellington Park Hotel in Belfast to give local councils, housing associations, commercial surveyors, owners and administrators of vacant property a chance to find out more about the concept.

The 'property guardian' concept has seen offices, warehouses, convents and even pubs turned into temporary low cost accommodation.

Camelot Property Management, which has utilised buildings across Europe by filling the empty space with people looking for affordable housing, is setting up in Northern Ireland.

The company said monthly rental costs for staying in the empty properties start at around £100 a month, including all bills.

In exchange, it said the owners of the buildings are able to mitigate against the risks of squatting, theft and vandalism.

Damian Woods, regional manager for Camelot Property Management, said: "With tens of thousands of commercial and residential buildings lying empty in Northern Ireland, managing vacant property has never been more critical for organisations, for communities and for economic
